GOVERNOR HOCHUL LAUNCHES APPLICATION FOR 2024 YOUTH AGRICULTURE LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

Conference Will be Held in November 2024 and Eligible Students Can Apply Through July 15—Application and More Information Available Here

Governor Kathy Hochul announced applications are now open for New York's first-ever collaborative youth agriculture leadership conference to support further collaboration among youth agriculture organizations and identify opportunities for youth engagement that reflect the industry's future workforce needs. Included in her 2024 State of the State, Governor Hochul will convene this conference in November 2024 in partnership with the Cornell University College of Agriculture and Life Sciences New York Agriculture Education & Outreach Program to provide New York students with agriculture educational, leadership and training opportunities.

Governor Hochul's first-ever youth agriculture leadership conference provides young leaders the opportunity to connect with state leaders and better understand how policy shapes the interconnected food, agriculture and natural resource industries. Students will explore the many challenges and possibilities within these industries with New York's top leaders, connect with other students and professionals regarding their own interests and aspirations, and discover the vast array of career possibilities that await them in the future.

This is an invitation-only conference and participation will be determined via the application process. Students in grades 11 or 12 that are active members of an FFA chapter or county 4-H program, or a Minorities in Agriculture, Natural Resources, and Related Sciences (MANRRS) junior or collegiate chapter, can apply here. The deadline to apply is July 15. Applications submitted after the deadline will be accepted on a rolling basis and reviewed chronologically if there are remaining conference spots available.

MVEDD ANNOUNCES DATE FOR THIRD & FINAL HOMESTEADING WORKSHOP, "FEED THE HOUSE"

The Mohawk Valley Economic Development District, Inc. (MVEDD), in partnership with a local seamstress, Lisa Smith, the Kirkland Town Library and Grow Amsterdam NY, has been awarded grant monies from the New York State Pollution Prevention Institute (NYSP2I) to host a series of educational community "Homesteader Workshops".

Through funding provided by the Environmental Protection Fund as administered by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), NYSP2I has selected 12 projects across NYS focusing on community-based pollution prevention strategies.

The term homesteading is defined as a lifestyle of self-sufficiency, including subsistence agriculture, home preservation of food, and small craft-like trades such as textile working and making common household items within the home. The epitome of homesteading is sustainability and reducing waste as a way of life.

MVEDD would like to announce its third and final homesteading workshop, called "Feed the House," which will take place on August 6, 2024, from 5:30pm-6:30pm at the Kirkland Town Library . You can register here, or by visiting our website www.mvedd.org.

This free workshop will include a presentation on proper storage of foods to extend shelf life, how to re-grow certain produce in your home from food scraps, basic gardening techniques, seed saving, and a discussion on microgreens! We will also have a demonstration on how to make your own reusable food wraps. Workshop attendees will receive seeds, a microgreen grow kit, and other giveaway items.

With the price of groceries increasing 5% from 2022, and nearly 40% of the food supply ending up in US land-fills, it is more important than ever to make sure purchased food stays fresh longer at home. "For many people, throwing food away because it has spoiled causes a lot of guilt. Even with a composting system, food should be eaten, not wasted," says Samantha Francisco, Clean Energy Specialist for MVEDD. "This workshop will provide helpful tips on how to extend the life of foods at home, and how to grow your own food in your kitchen and backyards. Making just a few simple changes can help bring down the grocery bill and reduce waste," she continued.

This collaboration became a partnership when the company became Medic/Epimed in 1994. In 1997 the company rebranded itself as Epimed International Inc. which is

the company that is known today.

The company at that time focused on interventional pain management products. Epimed was based in two locations – in Gloversville and in Texas. Epimed worked with Fulton County EDC and the IDA on the consolidation of the two New York facilities. In the fall of 2001 full production activities moved into the new 27,500 squarefoot facility on Sal Landrio Drive in Johnstown.

Today, three of the four Epimed Directors operate from the Dallas location. From Epimed Dallas Physician services, marketing, sales, internet website support, final product packaging and commercial distribution are performed. Epimed runs fully certified clean rooms in both Dallas and Gloversville.

There are 86 people employed by Epimed locally, with 145 employees total, including Dallas, Gloversville and sales representation around the country. Epimed manufactures and distributes to health care provides around the globe - Australia, South Korea, Japan, Maylasia, the Middle East, Europe, Brazil, Argentina and more. FAMILY COUNSELING CENTER FOCUSES ON FARMERS' MENTAL HEALTH

July is a busy month in upstate New York, especially for those who make a living in agriculture. The warm weather and long days mean that spring and summer are the busiest and most stressful time of the year for farmers – hay can only be done on sunny days and warm weather, and crops need to be planted and nurtured in order to grow and produce food either for market or for livestock. Weather and livestock are not the only stressors farmers face. Unique worries include fluctuating feed and input costs, volatile markets for the products they produce, heavy debt loads, physical isolation, and exhaustion from demanding workloads that often leave little time for personal care or relationships.

The idyllic landscape of a rural community, green fields, and hills dotted with livestock is both a reality and a myth. Across the country, approximately one-fifth of the population deals with mental health issues. Mental health includes social, emotional, and psychological well-being and affects nearly all aspects of daily life including physical health. While statistically, the occurrence of mental illness is consistent regardless of location, incidents of depression and suicide are twice as high in rural communities as in more urban settings. Studies, including those from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), have shown a higher rate of anxiety and depression in farmers and farmworkers than in the general population. In addition, farming and ranching have one of the highest suicide rates of all occupations, with farmers being 3.5 times more likely to die by suicide than the general population. Among farmer suicides, men 65 years old and older make up 45% of the cases. This may be connected to farm succession, with older farmers reducing their daily participation in the farm and therefore feeling a loss of identity and purpose.

Experts have identified three major barriers to mental health care in rural settings: availability, access, and acceptability. These factors, coupled with the cultural norms of farming which include self-reliance, independent spirit, and the stigma of depression or anxiety as weakness, can keep farmers from seeking help from family, friends, or professionals.

The Family Counseling Center has over 47 years of experience in the treatment of clients from rural and semi-rural communities. The agency's Fort Plain office is located in a facility that includes a dentist and podiatrist – allowing for co-located services and a level of anonymity for clients who are seeking care. Access to crisis counselors is available weekdays Monday to Thursday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Fridays 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the agency's Gloversville office.

Many farm families are working with limited access to health insurance. Rural residents are more often uninsured or underinsured and more likely to receive Medicaid, adding complexity to the reimbursement of services. The Family Counseling Center is a designated National Health Services Corps site, meaning that it serves all pa-

tients – regardless of their ability to pay. This designation, the agency's ability to accept Medicaid, Medicare, and other managed care coverage, and a sliding fee scale for patients who pay out-of-pocket means that the financial stress of paying for care is reduced.


