EMPIRE STATE DEVELOPMENT DIVISION OF SMALL BUSINESS

Small businesses make up 98 percent of New York State businesses and employ 40% of New York's private sector workforce. Empire State Development's Small Business Division supports the development and expansion of businesses with under 100 employees – directing an array of programs and initiatives supporting small business growth and helping entrepreneurs maximize opportunities for success. Explore all they offer, plus a custom business checklist of NYS programs and services that match your goals: This month we will take an in-depth look at the Empire State Development's SSBCI program:

NEW YORK STATE SMALL BUSINESS CREDIT INITIATIVE (SSBCI)

New York State has been awarded more than \$500 million in federal SSBCI funding to help small, and traditionally disadvantaged, businesses succeed-with a focus on postpandemic recovery. The SSBCI is a program through the American Rescue Plan Act and is managed by the U.S. Department of Treasury. SSBCI provides funds to support programs for small businesses, including socially and economically disadvantaged individual (SEDI) owned businesses and very small businesses (VSB), to recover from the economic effects of COVID-19 and allow them the opportunity to succeed in the post-pandemic economy. With this funding, Empire State Development (ESD) has developed a suite of capital access and equity programs to help New York State small businesses recover from the economic effects of COVID-19. These programs include: Initiative for Inclusive Entrepreneurship (Supplier Innovative Finance Program). This program provides an intentional path for suppliers to increase their capacity, gain awareness of innovative funding options, and access to capital through training, funder matchmaking, and a grant

for select businesses.

<u>Capital Project Loan Fund:</u> \$106M in SSBCI funding to provide direct loans for the growth of manufacturing and other eligible businesses by assisting in financing a portion of the cost of acquiring/renovating existing buildings, constructing new buildings, or purchasing equipment.

<u>New York State Small Business Revolving Loan Fund Round 2</u>: \$55.5M in SSBCI funding to provide shorter-term microloans and loans typically under \$250K. Ad-

dresses inequitable capital access by bridging the financing gaps facing new companies, under-banked communities and small businesses.

<u>Capital Access Program</u>: \$29.4M in SBCCI funding for portfolio insurance for participating lenders designed to increase financing opportunities for New York State's small businesses, SEDI-owned businesses and very small businesses (VSB).f Loands provided via participating lenders.

New York Forward Loan Fund 2: A \$150M expanded program offering qualifying small businesses and non-profits access to capital from mission-driven lenders, with loans of up to \$150K as well as free support services. New York State Surety Bond Assistance Program: \$22M in SSBCI funding to provide access to bid bonds, payment and performance bonds for contractors performing on publicly-funded projects throughout New York State via participating surety companies.

New York State Contractor Financing Program: \$22M in SSBCI funding to provide to contractors in need of working capital to deploy and execute federal, state and local government-related contracts via participating lenders. Emerging and Regional Partner Program Fund: \$102M in SSBCI funding for investing in diverse fund managers with first, second or third time funds, or with managers who will use the funds to invest in areas of NYS where venture capital is less readily available.

<u>Community and Regional Partner Program Fund</u>: \$52M in SSBCI funding for partnerships with accelerators or other similar mentor-based programs to provide equity investments for high-growth NYS companies that are participating in those programs.

<u>Pre-seed and Seed Matching Fund Program</u>: \$30M in SSBCI funding for equity investments in venture-backable start-up companies at the earliest states of their development. This program is via a competitive application process with applicants evaluated to assess likelihood of venture scalability.

New York State Innovation Venture Capital Fund: \$35M in SSBCI funding for equity investments for Seed through series B technology companies across NYS.

THE FAMILY COUNSELING CENTER OFFERS ADVICE ON DEALING WITH CHILD ANXIETY AND RETURN TO SCHOOL

September marks the start of the school year and for area school children an all-too-common sense of anxiety. The Family Counseling Center has worked with children in and around Fulton and Montgomery Counties for over 48 years and is offering some advice on how to help ease anxiety as the first day of school approaches.



Laressa Slater, LMSW, an Outpatient Mental Health Therapist at the Center, regularly works with children and notes that fears and anxieties can often manifest as physical symptoms. "Children may not have the awareness to directly speak about what they are worried about, but their bodies know. A child may complain of a stomach ache, headache, or dizziness. It's important to recognize that these symptoms are very real to them."



Setting a New Routine
Getting children acclimated to
their new school routine early is
helpful in reducing day-of anxieties. "Routine helps to set a
pattern of understanding for
children," notes Slater. "When
routines change, it can feel as if
their world has changed as well,
so a great way to get children
ready for school is to ease them
into their school-year routine a

week or two before the first day. Your child may only need a bedtime and wake-up routine, but they may also benefit from scheduling a playdate with a classmate the week before school begins. This would include waking up at the same time they will be when school starts, getting out the door when they will need to leave the house, and meeting up with their friend at the playground at their school." Facing Anxieties

A new school year means new classrooms, new teachers, and even new friends. For those transitioning from elementary to middle school or from middle to high school, it also means a completely new building.

"If you can, you may want to schedule a meet-and-greet between your child and their new teacher at the school," adds Slater. "The ability for a child to walk the space and meet their teacher can alleviate the worries they have about not being liked by the teacher, not knowing what to expect when they arrive, how they are going to find the new classroom, etc." For younger children, Slater suggests seeing if a handoff is available for the first week of school where the parent walks the child to the classroom or the teacher meets the parent and child at the front door of the school.

Validating Fears

"Sometimes children just need their parent or an adult to listen and validate their fears," states Slater. "We can often hear someone without listening and that can happen quickly especially when a child is crying or acting out. We hear 'I don't want to go' but we don't necessarily listen to the why." Slater adds that a child stating their worries is not an automatic request for their adult to problem solve. "Recognizing that their fears are real to them is the most important piece to listening," states Slater. In-Class Coping Skills

Children will also face anxiety when class starts and may have a moment where they need to cope with their fears in the middle of the day, in those instances Slater offers a few simple coping skills children can do at their desks.

Deep Breathing – Taking a few deep breaths while concentrating on the physical feeling of air filling the lungs and slowly exhaling can help calm nerves and lower your heart rate. 5-4-3-2-1 – This common grounding technique asks individuals to look around them and name five things they can see, four things they can touch, three things they can hear, two things they can smell, and one thing they can taste. "This practice helps to make you aware of everything around you in the moment and feel secure in the space you are in," notes Slater.

Fidgets – Fidgets allow a person to release excess energy and anxiety. They provide an individual with the ability to focus on the feeling, again grounding them in the moment.

Journaling and Doodling – "These offer a creative outlet for someone with anxiety," says Slater. "Writing down what is bothering you or drawing something can help you feel more calm and centered in a stressful situation."

Going for a Walk – "Going for a walk when appropriate can be an opportunity for the kiddo to clear their head or take a break," adds Slater.

The Family Counseling Center of Fulton County has been serving the community since 1976. The mission of The Family Counseling Center is to offer the skills, support, and guidance needed to assist all individuals and families in its service area with living their healthiest lives. The Center is licensed by the New York State Office of Mental Health, providing services to children as young as five years old. U.S. LIGHT ENERGY ACHIEVES PRES-TIGIOUS RECOGNITION: TOP SOLAR DEVELOPER BASED IN NY, SIXTH IN THE NATION FOR COMMUNITY SOLAR

U.S. Light Energy ("USLE"), a distributed generation energy development company specializing in community solar and renewable energy solutions, today announced it has been named the top solar developer based in New York, and the nation's sixth-largest developer of community solar, in annual rankings just released by Solar Power World, the premier

In compiling its list of 2024 Top Solar Contractors, Solar Power World ranked companies according to the kilowatt (kw) capacity of projects they installed, developed or helped construct in the previous year within the U.S and its territories. During 2023, New York-based USLE installed 17,641 kw of solar, which



also ranked 18th nationally in all solar development.

This prestigious recognition reflects the rapid growth and successful track record of USLE in delivering innovative community solar and renewable energy solutions," said Mark Richardson, Chief Executive Officer of U.S. Light Energy. "Solar projects in every market residential to utility -scale — are getting bigger and oftentimes more complicated in scope, financing and per-

mitting. That's why it's all the more impressive when so many top installation companies have banner years," said Kelly Pickerel, editor in chief of Solar Power World.

From its original concentration on rooftop solar when it was formed in 2016, USLE has transitioned its focus to community solar projects, which enable energy users to subscribe to a shared system of solar panels, often located within their community. As a result, both residential and commercial customers can reap the benefits of renewable energy, from reduced cost and increased resilience to improved access for low- to moderate-income households, community ownership, and equitable workforce development and entrepreneurship.

SUCCESSFUL CLEAN UP SEASON FROM KEEP MOHAWK VALLEY BEAUTIFUL

Keep Mohawk Valley Beautiful (KMVB), a six-county NYS affiliate of the national Keep America Beautiful (KAB) program, is celebrating the achievements of the Mohawk Valley's 23rd annual Great American Cleanup, KMVB is a standing committee of the Mohawk Valley Economic Development District, Inc. (MVEDD).

KAB works to create sustainable communities that are socially connected, environmentally healthy and economically sound. Their annual cleanup effort is the country's largest community improvement program. Each Spring, KAB affiliates, like KMVB, engage more than 4 million volunteers in more than 20,000 communities nationwide.

This year, KMVB earned a grant from M&T Charitable



Foundation. This donation allowed KMVB to purchase additional sizes of clean up bags. This contribution, along with the longstanding support of Bank of Utica, Northern Safety, CABVI, Standard Insulating Co., GreenUtica, Positively Rome, the City of Utica, M&T Bank, the Genesis Group, Rome Clean & Green, as well as the Otsego, Schoharie, Herkimer and Fulton-Montgomery Chamber of

Commerce offices, made this year's cleanup a great success. This year, KMVB welcomed a new partner, Utica Creative Reuse. Local artist and founder of this nonprofit organization, Sarah Marris-Swann, was awarded a grant* through CNY Arts to host the "Trash to Treasure Art Challenge," a community art project in Utica, NY. This project welcomed local artists to collect litter and incorporate the items into a piece of art. The project's 2024 Earth Day Cleanup had over 40 participants that collected a total of 70 bags of litter.

There are environmental and economic costs to litter that negatively impact local wildlife, public drainage systems, road

safety and property values.

If picking up litter is not something you can commit to – there are other ways you can get involved. KMVB supports various recycling and beautification projects in the region. Sam Russo, a KMVB board member, and Allysa Dupont, Office Manager of MVEDD, have maintained perennial gardens in the Mohawk Valley, and are always looking to partner up with local community groups to build more. This year, they cleaned up the three garden beds at the Mohawk Homestead, and planted perennial plants (donated from GreenUtica) and native flowers (donated by Sam Russo). They also cleaned 300 feet of garden space and planted more of the perennials and native plants at the Utica Public Library, as well as assisting the Frankfort Community Garden and Pierstown Grange in Cooperstown. Other gardens include the Historic Parkhurst Baseball Field in Gloversville, and the Schoharie County Chamber of Commerce.

Groups will be able to register for the annual event next Spring on MVEDD's website, www.mvedd.org. By registering, you will be eligible to receive free materials including gloves, trash bags and other assistance. KMVB encourages any individual or group hosting a cleanup, community garden, recycling or beautification project – new or existing – to **register** their event.
